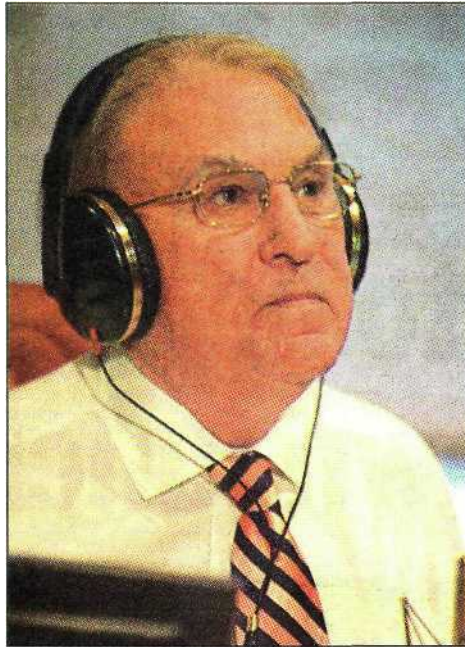


'If I win this, it will have taken a poof to teach John Laws a lesson'

GAY activist Gary Burns is confident about the outcome of his homosexual vilification complaint against broadcasters John Laws and Steve Price and radio station 2UE.

The Administrative Decisions Tribunal will decide tomorrow if comments made by Laws and Price on 2UE this year incited hatred, contempt and ridicule of homosexuals.

"I'm nervous but quite positive," Mr Burns said.

"If I win, it will have taken a poof to teach him a lesson."

"I'm very nervous. I've had death threats and my boyfriend and I have broken up over it."

If found guilty, the parties would be fined and ordered to make a public apology on air and in writing.

Mr Burns took action this year after Laws and Price had commented about the appearance of gay couple Wazza and Gav on the first series of the Channel Nine television program *The Block*.

He said the comments encouraged listeners to think homosexuals were sick and linked to pedophilia.

He said the decision would be an important test of the **homosexual vilification provisions contained within the Anti-Discrimination Act.**

Laws needed to be made accountable for his comments and realise he was not above the law, Mr Burns said.

A spokesman for Laws, John Fordham, declined to comment. Meanwhile, last Wednesday, Mr Burns filed another complaint against Laws, this time for serious homosexual vilification. If convicted of this, Laws could be jailed.

Mr Burns alleges Laws's comments about *Queer Eye For The Straight Guy* star Carson Kressley on November 3 would incite violence against homosexuals. Laws had called Kressley a "pompous little pansy prig" and "a pillow biter" and ended with the words "piss off, pansy".

The complaint is against Laws only, not his employer, 2UE.

"John Laws is not going to hide behind the skirt of Radio 2UE - I'm

going to pull him out of the skirt and deal with him," Mr Burns said.

"He's going to be held accountable for this."

Last week, Laws apologised for his comments about Kressley. The apology appeared in the gay publication, the *Sydney Star Observer*.

"My intentions were humorous and satirical, and this is how I believe people who heard my show that morning would have reacted," Laws said.

"I do apologise to you for any distress my words might have caused, especially if you might have come to believe I was condoning or supporting any form of verbal or physical violence directed at gay men and lesbians."
